



## 2011 ANNUAL SECURITY REPORT

Your safety is important to Stetson University College of Law. For that reason, and in compliance with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act (“the Clery Act”), this report, produced by the Stetson Public Safety Department in collaboration with various departments and administrators, constitutes our annual disclosure of current policies with regard to crime reporting and campus security. This report also includes the required annual listing of crime statistics. Policy revisions do occur from time to time, so any individual reading this report is encouraged to contact the Public Safety Department to obtain any policy updates since the date this report was published. ## I. REPORTING A CRIME OR EMERGENCY

### A. *General Procedures*

Community members, students, faculty, staff, and guests are encouraged to report all crimes and public safety related incidents to the Public Safety Department in a timely manner. This publication focuses on the Public Safety Department because it patrols all of the Gulfport and Tampa campuses.

To report a crime or an emergency on the Gulfport campus, call 911 and then call Public Safety at (727) 343-1262.

To report a crime or an emergency on the Tampa campus, call 911 and then call Public Safety at (727) 420-8868.

Public Safety Officers are available at these numbers 24 hours a day. In response to a call, Public Safety Officers take any needed action, including but not limited to dispatching an Officer to the site of the complaint, contacting or coordinating any additional off-campus emergency assistance, and/or asking the victim to report to Public Safety to file an incident report.

Incident reports are forwarded to the appropriate deans and/or administrators as appropriate for any necessary follow-up.

If assistance is required from the Gulfport Police Department or the Tampa Police Department and the agency has not already been contacted, Public Safety will contact the appropriate agency.

Crimes should be reported to the Public Safety Department even if the individual does not wish to involve law enforcement to ensure inclusion in the annual crime statistics and to aid in providing Security Alerts to the community, when appropriate. More detail regarding the circumstances under which the College of Law issues a Security Alert is contained in Section II below.

### B. *Reporting a Crime*

Dial 911 for emergencies. Contact the Public Safety Department 24 hours a day at (727) 343-1262 in Gulfport and at (727) 420-8868 in Tampa, or use the yellow call box phones located in the parking lots, residential areas, recreational facility areas, and near buildings. See Appendix A for a Quick Reference Guide on the location of emergency call boxes.

## Academics

Any suspicious activity or person seen in the parking lots or loitering around vehicles, inside buildings, or around residential housing should be reported to the local police department by calling 911 and to Public Safety using the above 24/7 phone numbers.

### *C. Limited Confidential Reporting*

The Public Safety Department encourages anyone who is the victim or witness to any crime to promptly report the incident to the Public Safety Department. If you are the victim of a crime and do not want to pursue an action with the College of Law under our internal procedures or through the criminal justice system, you should still consider filing a report. The purpose of a report is to allow the College of Law to take steps to enhance the safety of yourself and others. With such information, the College of Law can keep accurate records of the number of incidents involving students, determine whether there a pattern of crime exists with respect to a particular location, method, or assailant, and alert the campus to any potential danger. Reports filed in this manner are also counted and disclosed in the annual crime statistics for the College of Law. They are also maintained in a confidential fashion with disclosure internally or externally only when deemed reasonably necessary for the safety of the student or others, when disclosure is required by law, or when disclosure and follow up on information contained in a report is warranted under our policies, as part of our ethical obligations in certifying student character and fitness for purposes of bar admission, or as deemed appropriate in the form of referral to the Student Support and Emergency Team (SSET) so that support and assistance efforts can be coordinated.

### *D. Policy Statement Addressing Counselors*

The College of Law does not employ pastoral and professional counselors directly. The College of Law has a contract for services with Eckerd College to provide student counseling on a confidential basis. The College of Law encourages these professional counselors, at their discretion, to inform those they counsel of procedures for reporting crimes voluntarily and confidentially for inclusion in the institution's annual security report. The College of Law also allows and encourages individuals to use the limited confidential reporting option detailed above. In this way, the College of Law can provide appropriate support and referrals to counseling sources.

### *E. Policy Statement on Missing Students*

The risk that a student might go missing is a concern for all colleges and universities. A report of a missing student can come from a variety of sources, including family, friends, or fellow students. Because of our concern for student safety, and in accordance with federal law, the College of Law has established a missing student notification policy and procedure. ## II. SECURITY ALERTS AND OTHER EMERGENCY INFORMATION

Security Alerts are warnings issued by the College of Law (typically by the Public Safety Chief or Dean) immediately upon confirming a significant emergency or dangerous on-campus

situation that involves an immediate threat to the health or safety of students or employees and gathering sufficient information to issue a Security Alert. The intent of a Security Alert is to caution the campus community about immediate threats, thereby enabling community members to take precautions to protect themselves. Therefore, a public warning may not be issued if we determine in the exercise of professional judgment that it will compromise efforts to assist the victim, respond to or otherwise contain the emergency.

Security Alerts will be issued through the campus email system to students, faculty, and staff, in all areas determined to possibly be affected by the emergency. The following additional means of communication may also be used:

- text-messaging and/or reverse 911 system to those who have registered for these services;
- the daily announcements page of the intranet, which is available to faculty, students, and staff,
- if during regular business hours, on bulletin boards in the following locations: Public Safety bulletin board (Gulfport campus), HR bulletin board outside Business Office (Gulfport), Facilities Management bulletin board (Gulfport), and General Announcements bulletin board (Tampa campus outside administrative offices).

Security Alerts may be issued for threats to property, as well as threats to persons. Nothing prohibits the issuance of Security Alerts for crimes or continuing threats to the campus community beyond those crimes and incidents subject to data collection and reporting under the College of Law Annual Security Report.

After a Security Alert has been issued, follow-up to the initial Security Alert will be issued as needed, typically by email unless circumstances warrant other forms of communication as detailed above.

Anyone with information he or she believes warrants the issuance of a Security Alert should report the circumstances to the Public Safety Department at (727) 343-1262 in Gulfport or at (727) 420-8868 in Tampa, or in person at the Public Safety Department on the Gulfport campus.

The College of Law also maintains a Campus Emergency Preparedness web page, available at <http://www.law.stetson.edu/Preparedness/>, which provides important information about emergency preparedness on campus. On an annual basis, the College of Law publicizes its emergency response procedures for the entire campus. Testing of emergency response and evacuation procedures will also occur at least once per calendar year, and documentation maintained by the Public Safety Department describing each such test, the date and time, and whether it was announced or unannounced. Testing may include regularly scheduled drills, exercises, systems tests, and other appropriate follow-through activities designed for assessment and evaluation of emergency plans and capabilities. The College of Law also makes available to faculty, staff and students several online training programs on various safety issues. Stetson University College of Law has developed procedures for communicating crisis information via the Stetson Law Web site, text message and e-mail alerts, reverse 911 messages, an emergency hotline, intercom, and the news media as needed. In general, the College of Law uses the following:

- Text messages and reverse 911 calls to cell phones of members of the Stetson community who have registered for this service on the College of Law intranet;
- Announcements on television, radio stations, newspapers, and media internet sites in the greater St. Petersburg, Tampa, and Sarasota areas.

In addition, the College of Law has a back-up telephone system, a back-up web page, a small bank of satellite phones, and alternative e-mail accounts for use by administrators in communicating if the College of Law system is unavailable. The method(s) used will depend on its availability at the time, and the nature of the crisis or emergency. The College of Law will endeavor to use all reasonably available means to communicate information. The College of Law also may use other methods as appropriate, such as departmental telephone trees, emergency blogs, or social networking sites such as Facebook, but use of other methods is based on specific circumstances and should not be relied upon as a substitute for each individual checking the sources listed above.

In conjunction with the publication of this annual Clery report, the College of Law has also published its Annual Fire Safety Plan and Report. ### III. SEXUAL ASSAULT PREVENTION AND RESPONSE

#### A. *Introduction*

Sexual assault is the commission of an unwanted sexual act, whether by an acquaintance or by a stranger, that occurs without indication of consent of both individuals, or that occurs under threat or coercion. Sexual assault can occur either forcibly and/or against a person's will, or when a person is incapable of giving consent. A person is legally incapable of giving consent if less than the age recognized by law, if intoxicated by drugs and/or alcohol, if developmentally disabled, or if temporarily or permanently mentally or physically unable to do so.

Under federal and state law, sexual assault includes, but is not limited to, rape, forcible sodomy, forcible oral copulation, sexual assault with an object, sexual battery, forcible fondling (e.g., unwanted touching or kissing for purposes of sexual gratification), and threat of sexual assault.

Sexual assault is unacceptable and will not be tolerated at the College of Law. Any individual who has been sexually assaulted is urged to make an official report. A report of a sexual assault will be dealt with promptly. Confidentiality will be maintained to the greatest extent reasonably possible.

The College of Law is committed to providing information regarding on- and off-campus services and resources. Any of the resources listed in this policy can assist a person to access the full range of services available.

### *B. Reporting Offenses*

If you are a victim of a sexual assault at the College of Law, your first priority should be to get to a place of safety. You should then obtain necessary medical treatment. The Public Safety Department strongly advocates that a victim of sexual assault report the incident in a timely manner. Time is a critical factor for evidence collection and preservation. An assault should be reported directly to the Public Safety Department. On the Gulfport campus, call Public Safety at (727) 343-1262. On the Tampa campus, call Public Safety at (727) 420-8868. For programs abroad, report to the Resident Director. If you are at an off-site program, report to the highest level College official present. You may also report the sexual assault to the head of Student Life. Filing a security report with the College will not obligate the victim to prosecute. Filing a report will:

- ensure that a victim of sexual assault receives the necessary medical treatment and tests;
- provide the opportunity for the College of Law to assist in contacting law enforcement for the collection of evidence helpful in prosecution, which cannot be obtained later (ideally a victim of sexual assault should not wash, douche, use the toilet, or change clothing prior to a medical/legal exam); and
- assure the victim has access to free confidential counseling from counselors specifically trained in the area of sexual assault crisis intervention.

### *C. Confidentiality*

The College of Law will make every effort reasonably possible to preserve an individual's privacy and protect the confidentiality of information. The degree, to which confidentiality can be protected, however, depends upon the professional role of the person being consulted. The professional being consulted should make these limits clear before any disclosure of facts. An individual can speak confidentially with certain individuals in legally protected roles. They include sexual assault counselors such as those under the Employee Assistance Program and Eckerd counseling agreement for students, medical clinicians, and clergy. Exceptions to maintaining confidentiality are generally set by law; for example, physicians and nurses who treat a physical injury sustained during sexual assault are often required to report it to law enforcement. Also, physicians, nurses, psychologists, psychiatrists, and social workers typically must report a sexual assault committed against a minor.

Information shared with other individuals is not legally protected from being disclosed. For example, the head of Student Life, the Manager of Residential Properties, or other faculty or staff members may need to inform other individuals to protect their safety or rights, in fairness to the persons involved, or in response to legal or institutional requirements. In addition, under the

Clery Act, the College of Law is required by law to report specified factual details about incidents occurring on campus. These reports are for statistical purposes and do not include individual identities.

As a private institution, the College of Law has the ability to and does keep confidential the identity of a person officially reporting a sexual assault. However, if the police initiate an investigation and the State Attorney files a criminal charge, confidentiality may not be maintained.

If a complaint is filed or referred under the Code of Student Professionalism and Conduct, or under the Academic Honor Code (as a cross-referral from the Professionalism Code when punishments at or more severe than suspension are at issue), then the accused student will be provided with the name of the complainant and victim.

As required by law, all disclosures to any College of Law employee of an on-campus sexual assault must be reported for statistical purposes only (without personal identifiers) to the Department of Public Safety, which has the responsibility for tabulating and annually publishing sexual assault and other crime statistics. To promote public safety, the Department also alerts the campus community to immediate threats to campus safety by issuing Security Alerts.

When a sexual assault victim contacts the Public Safety Department, the appropriate law enforcement agency may also be notified if requested by the victim. The College of Law will assist the individual in any reports to law enforcement if requested. For students, a representative from the Office of Student Life will also be notified. The victim of a sexual assault may choose for the investigation to be pursued through the criminal justice system and/or the College of Law Code of Student Professionalism and Conduct or Academic Honor Code. A College of Law representative from the Public Safety Department or the Office of Student Life will offer support to the victim regarding the available options and to the extent reasonable support the victim in his or her decision. Counseling is available for students through Eckerd College. Details may be obtained from the Office of Student Life Counseling and support is available for employees from the Office of Human Resources through the Employee Assistance Program.

#### *D. Disciplinary Procedures*

Employee disciplinary procedures and penalties are detailed in various applicable policies. College of Law disciplinary proceedings for students are detailed in the Code of Student Professionalism and Conduct and the Academic Honor Code. Both the accused and the victim have the same opportunities to have others present during a campus disciplinary proceeding where permitted. Under applicable federal regulations, the College of Law is permitted to release the results of a disciplinary proceeding regarding a crime of violence or a non-forcible sex offense if the perpetrator has violated the College's policies and is found to be an alleged perpetrator of a crime of violence or a non-forcible sex offense. The College may not disclose the names of any other student, including a victim or witness, without prior written consent of the student. The College of Law is required (under the Campus Sexual Assault Victim Bill of Rights) to release the results of a disciplinary proceeding to a victim and the accused when the proceeding involves a sex offense. In addition, the following special guidelines apply. A student found in violation of the Code of Student Professionalism and Conduct, or the Academic Honor Code where the matter has been referred, could be criminally prosecuted and may be subject to

any of the listed sanctions under the Code of Student Professionalism and Conduct, or expulsion under the Academic Honor Code for the first offense.

*E. Change in Academic or Living Conditions*

Student victims have the option to change their academic and/or on-campus living situations after an alleged sexual assault, if such changes are reasonably available. Such requests should be coordinated through the head of Student Life.

*F. Education and Resources*

The College of Law educates the student community about sexual assaults and date rape through mandatory initial student orientation for each entering class. The Office of Student Life offers sexual assault information to students upon request. Literature on date rape education and risk reduction are available for the entire campus through the Office of Student Life and the Public Safety Department.

An individual who has been sexually assaulted, whether by rape or another unwanted sexual contact, is urged to make an official report to Public Safety Department. Whether or not a victim of sexual assault chooses to make an official report, he or she is urged to seek appropriate help. There are numerous resources for faculty, staff, students, and visitors to campus.

Specific resources, either on or off campus, for medical treatment, legal evidence collection, and obtaining information, support and counseling are listed below. Each resource can assist a person to access the full range of services available.

- **Medical Treatment** — An individual who has been sexually assaulted is urged to seek appropriate medical evaluation as promptly as possible. For life-threatening conditions, call 911 or go to the Emergency Room of the nearest hospital. For treatment of less serious injuries or for evaluation and prevention of sexually transmitted diseases and pregnancy, as well as consultation for other health issues, individuals and/or their spouses/domestic partners should seek medical treatment using ordinary channels such as local clinics or personal physicians.
- **Medical-Legal Evidence Collection** — An individual who has been sexually assaulted (particularly by rape, forcible oral copulation, or sodomy) is encouraged to request collection of medical-legal evidence. Prompt collection of physical evidence is essential should a person later decide to pursue criminal prosecution and/or a civil action. To obtain a free medical-legal exam, the individual will need to contact the police and file a police report.
- **Obtaining Information, Support, and Counseling** — Whether or not one chooses to make an official report, an individual who has been sexually assaulted is encouraged to obtain information, support and counseling. The degree to which confidentiality can be protected depends upon the professional role of the person being consulted and should be addressed with that person before specific facts are disclosed. Counseling referrals or information can, in the case of employees, be obtained from Human Resources. For students, counseling is available through Eckerd College by contacting Eckerd directly at

727-864-8248 or through referral by the Office of Student Life. Off-campus options include:

#### IV. SEXUAL OFFENDER REGISTRATION

The Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act (CSPA) of 2000 is a federal law that requires institutions of higher education to issue a statement advising the campus community where law enforcement agency information provided by a state concerning registered sex offenders may be obtained. It also requires sex offenders already required to register in a state to provide notice, as required under State law, of each institution of higher education in that state at which the person is employed, carries on a vocation, or is a student.

#### V. CAMPUS ACCESS POLICY

The College's public areas — parking lots, fields, lobby, and driveway areas — are accessible twenty-four hours a day. All non-public areas of the campus are locked at the conclusion of the scheduled events each day and after-hours accessibility is limited to authorized personnel.

During business hours, the College (excluding residential areas) will be open to students, parents, employees, contractors, guests, and invitees. During non-business hours, access to all College facilities is by key, if issued, or by admittance via the Public Safety Department with appropriate permission. Classrooms, seminar rooms, and courtrooms are locked and unlocked according to daily usage schedules posted on the Public Safety Officers' information pass-on board.

The Law Library in Gulfport is open to faculty, staff, students, and the general public based upon a posted schedule under the direction of the Director of the Law Library. After hours' access to the Gulfport Law Library using a swipe card system is also available, but is not generally available to members of the public. Access to residential areas is limited to students and their guests and authorized College of Law personnel.

## VI. SECURITY OF CAMPUS FACILITIES

Public Safety Officers patrol both the Gulfport and Tampa campuses twenty-four hours a day. In Tampa, patrol is by foot. In Gulfport, patrol is by foot, vehicle, and bicycle. Officers also conduct visual inspections of all College facilities with regard to safety. Officers conduct lighting inspections and test emergency call boxes, generating work orders for repairs of any deficiencies. Additionally, Officers report any overgrown trees or hedges that may cause a security concern, including those near residential housing areas.

## VII. REPORTING THE ANNUAL DISCLOSURE OF CRIME STATISTICS

The Public Safety Department prepares this report to comply with the *Clery Act*. The full text of this report can be located on the Public Safety Department web page at <http://www.law.stetson.edu/pubsafety/>. This report is prepared in cooperation with College of Law deans, administrators and department heads as well as local law enforcement agencies surrounding our main campus in Gulfport and our Tampa campus.

Campus crime, arrest, and referral statistics include those reported to Public Safety, local law enforcement agencies, and designated campus officials (including but not limited to directors, deans, and department heads). The University submits this annual report on crime statistics to the State of Florida and the U.S. Department of Education. In accordance with *Clery* requirements, the College of Law follows the Federal Bureau of Investigation's (FBI's) *Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook* for crime reporting. In addition, any of the required categories of *Clery* reportable crimes and any other crime involving bodily injury that also meet the definition of a hate crime under the FBI's *Uniform Crime Reporting Hate Crime Data Collection and Training Guide for Hate Crime Data Collection* is reported under hate crimes. Beginning with the crime statistics reporting for calendar year 2008, the reporting of hate crimes was expanded to include the additional otherwise non-reportable crimes of larceny-theft, simple assault, intimidation and destruction, damage, or vandalism of property if such crime(s) meets the definition of a hate crime.

## VIII. SECURITY AWARENESS AND CRIME PREVENTION PROGRAMS

During new student orientation each August, students are informed about services offered by the Public Safety Department. The Chief of Public Safety addresses all new students regarding ways to maintain personal safety. Students are told about crime on campus and in surrounding neighborhoods. Students are informed of availability of Public Safety escort services, parking lot safety and security patrols, and emergency call box locations around campus. At orientation, all students are given a Public Safety handbook containing information on the Campus Sex Crime Prevention Act, crime statistics, campus access policies, security in residence halls, alcohol and drug policies, and community responsibility in safety programs.

Applicants for employment are notified regarding this report via the Human Resources employment page and through notification on the employment application.

Safety and security information is also available on the College website on the Public Safety web pages, in pamphlet form, and one-on-one upon request to the Public Safety Department.

All students and employees are encouraged to be aware of their responsibility for their own security and the security of others.

When time is of the essence, information is released to the college community through Security Alerts via email, text messaging, and voice broadcasting system.

The College of Law does not provide specific crime prevention programs other than the services listed above.

## IX. CRIMINAL ACTIVITY BY OFF-CAMPUS STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

The College of Law does not have any officially recognized off-campus student organizations. Therefore, local police are not used for police monitoring of such entities. Off-campus criminal activity by individual students is reportable in accordance with the College of Law policy on Amendment to Admissions Application, while employees should report any arrest to the Office of Human Resources.

## X. ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES AND ILLEGAL DRUGS

### A. *General Prohibition*

The possession, sale, or furnishing of alcohol on the College campuses is governed by the College's alcohol policy and Florida state law. In keeping with the Drug-Free Schools and Committees Act Amendments of 1989, abusive or unlawful use of alcohol or use of any controlled or unlawful substance is prohibited on the College of Law's property at any time, or at any college-sponsored activity. It is unlawful to sell, furnish or provide alcohol to a person under the age of 21. It is a violation of the College's alcohol policy for anyone to consume or possess alcohol in any public area of the campus without prior College approval.

It is illegal under both state and federal laws to manufacture, distribute, dispense, possess, or use a controlled substance on any College of Law property or at any college-sponsored activity. A student's violation of the policy will subject the student to sanctions as set forth in the Code of Student Professionalism and Conduct or the Academic Honor Code. In addition, the student, staff or faculty member is subject to referral for prosecution under the laws of the State of Florida and the United States of America.

Information for students regarding area drug and alcohol counseling and rehabilitation programs is available through the Office of Student Life. Employees may receive counseling through the University's EAP program and/or information provided by the Office of Human Resources at the College of Law by dialing (727) 562-7807.

#### *B. Alcohol and Substance Abuse Information*

In addition to the above, alcohol and substance abuse education is provided at all mandatory initial student orientations. Student organizations also must go through special approval processes designed to assist in promoting student safety and wellbeing of students in order to serve alcohol at events.

The College of Law also participates annually in the CORE Drug and Alcohol Survey to better understand issues of drug use and to tailor prevention strategies to reduce abuse. Employees are provided with periodic materials regarding drug and alcohol abuse and available resources through dissemination and posting of materials from the College of Law Employee Assistance Program.

### XI. CAMPUS POLICE AUTHORITY AND JURISDICTION

The College's Public Safety officers are not sworn law enforcement personnel; therefore, they do not have any arrest powers beyond the citizen's arrest. Officers have the authority to ask persons for identification and to determine whether individuals have lawful business at the College. They enforce the College's policies. They have the authority to issue parking tickets. Criminal incidents are referred to the local police who have jurisdiction on the campuses. The College of Law does not have any written agreements or memoranda of understanding with local law enforcement agencies for the investigation of alleged criminal offenses on campus. Rather crime reports and investigations are handled in accordance with the responding agency's own policies and procedures.

The Public Safety Department has a close working relationship with local law enforcement agencies in Gulfport, St. Petersburg, and Tampa. Officers assist these agencies with incidents that occur both on and off campus. The Public Safety Department schedules instructional classes for the officers relating to fire safety, campus security, and CPR/AED.

Officers are required to possess a Class "D" security license. Officers are assigned to both campuses – Gulfport and Tampa – and patrol the campuses twenty-four hours a day. All officers receive training in the use of defensive tactics, expandable baton, defensive spray, crime and fire prevention, report writing, patrol techniques, and the use of force.

### XII. NON-RETALIATION FOR CLERY IMPLEMENTATION

The College of Law, its officers, employees, and agents are prohibited from retaliating, intimidating, threatening, coercing, or otherwise discriminating against any individual with respect to the implementation of any provision of the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act. Any student believing this policy has been

violated should immediately report that fact to the Associate Dean for Academics. Any employee believing this policy has been violated should immediately report that fact to Human Resources. Any other individual believing this policy has been violated should immediately report that fact to the Office of Human Resources.
